Almost **1 in 7** strokes are fatal



Around **1 in 4** strokes happen in people of working age



1 in 5 women and 1 in 6 men will have a stroke in their lifetime



One third of stroke survivors feel abandoned upon discharge from hospital

22.4 million

people are affected by or connected to stroke





Three quarters of stroke survivors experience at least one mental health problem following a stroke



Over **65%** of stroke survivors leave hospital with a disability

There are more than 100,000 strokes in the UK each year.



1.3 million

There are over 1.3 million stroke survivors in the UK.



The cost of stroke to society is around £26 billion a year.












Impact of stroke





of stroke survivors told us their lives had been affected by stroke. Many of these people felt this impact was significant.

98%



64% of stroke survivors told us their hobbies had been impacted by their stroke.



For 69% of people stroke

had impacted their independence.



Over half of stroke survivors told us their relationships had been impacted by their stroke, but only a third had accessed relationship support.




More than a **third** of working age stroke survivors gave up work following their stroke.

1. Signals go from one cell to another forming a connection in the brain. 2. When a stroke kills brain cells, it damages the connection. 3. Brain cells can sometimes form new connections, and start sending signals again.

Stroke prevention



What causes stroke?

- Age
- Health problems
 - Atrial fibrillation (irregular heartbeat)
 - High blood pressure
 - Diabetes
 - High cholesterol
- Lifestyle
 - Smoking
 - Being overweight
 - Drinking too much alcohol
 - Being inactive
- Family history
- Ethnicity

What can I do to reduce my risk?

- Drink alcohol within safe limits
- Get help to stop smoking
- Stay a healthy weight
- Eat a healthy diet
- Be as active as you can
- Get regular health checks

Facial weakness **Arm** weakness Speech problems Time to call 999

Other symptoms of stroke

- Sudden weakness or numbness on one side of the body, including legs, hands or feet.
- Difficulty finding words or speaking in clear sentences.
- Sudden blurred vision or loss of sight in one or both eyes.
- Sudden memory loss or confusion, and dizziness or a sudden fall.
- A sudden, severe headache.
- If you spot any of these signs of a stroke, don't wait. Call 999 straight away.
